



Special Exhibition *Masterpieces* from the Hatakeyama Memorial Museum of Fine Art Noh, Chanoyu, and Rinpa October 9–December 5, 2021, Heisei Chishinkan Wing

The Hatakeyama Memorial Museum of Fine Art, located in the quiet neighborhood of Shirokanedai, Tokyo, was opened in 1964 to house the collection of Ebara Corporation founder Hatakeyama Issei (1881–1971). In addition to being a successful industrialist, Hatakeyama was also a student of the Noh theater, a tea practitioner, and an avid art collector, for which reason he is better known in cultural circles by his artistic sobriquet of Sokuō.

This is the first comprehensive exhibition ever held in the Kansai region to showcase the Hatakeyama Memorial Museum of Fine Art's important holdings. The museum houses approximately 1,300 works of Japanese, Chinese, and Korean art, including six National Treasures and thirty-three Important Cultural Properties with a focus on prized tea utensils. The collection includes works with strong ties to Hatakeyama's hometown of Kanazawa, costumes and masks from the Noh theater that helped to foster his tastes and aesthetic sensibilities, as well as legendary ensembles of utensils use in tea gatherings, exemplifying his passion for and enjoyment of Japanese traditional culture. Hatakeyama's ideals are perhaps best encapsulated by his collector's seal reading, Sokuō yoshū aigan ("Sokuō's Cherished Pleasures, Offered to the People"). This phrase exemplifies his philosophy that art objects should not be monopolized by the few but shared widely with those who appreciate them.

Finally, we would like to express our sincere gratitude to all those who generously lent valuable works to this exhibition, as well as to the many people who helped make it happen.

ACCESS

VIA JR OR SUBWAY

Get off at Kyoto Station. From bus platform D2 in front of the station, take City Bus #206 or #208 to the "Hakubutsukan Sanjusangendo-mae" bus stop. One-minute walk to the Museum.

VIA KEIHAN RAILWAY

Get off at Shichijo Station. Walk east along Shichijo/Nanajo Street (about seven minutes) to the Museum.

VIA HANKYU RAILWAY

Get off at Kyotokawaramachi Station. Walk east over the bridge to the Keihan Railway Gionshijo Station. Take Osaka-bound Keihan train to Shichijo Station. Walk east along Shichijo/Nanajo Street (about seven minutes) to the Museum.
