2022 is the Year of the Tiger. The tiger has a rich history in Japanese art, despite the fact that it is not native to Japan. How did people depict an animal that they could not observe in real life? Artists and craftsmen of the past relied on a mix of pictures, stories, and fur pelts imported from distant lands as a basis for imagining what these ferocious felines must have looked like. The tigers assembled in this exhibition represent a diverse range of understandings that the people of Japan and East Asia brought to this most mysterious of wild animals.

Feature Exhibition Nishimiyayama Kofun Unearthed Artifacts from the Tomb of a Harima Chieftain January 2-February 13, 2022, Heisei Chishinkan Wing, Gallery 1F-2

The Nishimiyayama Kofun (tumulus) in Tatsuno, Hyōgo prefecture, is a rare example of a keyhole-shaped tumulus from the latter part of the Kofun period (ca. 3rd. c.–6th c.), which preserves the original contents of its burial goods. This exhibition presents findings from a collaborative research project carried out between the Kyoto National Museum and the Tatsuno History and Culture Museum in 2019 and 2020. It features artifacts and documents that tell a new story of the tomb, as well as the history of Harima and its relation to central political structures during the age of ancient Japanese state formation.
